Dear Ones,

On the weekend of June 24-25, fifteen leaders of our church participated in "Strategic Envisioning"

with the help of the Malphurs Group. During this weekend we developed a new "Mission Statement" for Heritage UMC. Our new "Mission Statement" is as follows: "Our mission is to Know... Follow... Share... Jesus Christ." This statement is rooted in Acts 2:41-47. This helps us to remember that there are three important functions we must continually be about. These three steps will become our discipleship pathway over the following years. We will slowly align our activities with these three steps. We are to know Jesus Christ. We are to follow Jesus Christ, and we are to share Jesus Christ. In order to be the church that Christ calls us to be. these three elements must be a part of all that we do. During this weekend, we also discovered our top six values. They are as follows: Community, Prayer, Worship, (generosity with our time, talents and treasures), Bible Knowledge, and Service. We also agreed to two aspirational values, (values that are not yet top priorities yet are needed in order to live out the Great Commission) Evangelism and Fellowship. Over the next twelve months the Strategic Planning Team will explore practical ways to live out our mission statement and values. At first it will mean little changes, but they will lead to big changes and these will cause our church to grow. But we will need everyone to be involved in this process. We need everyone's cooperation going forward. If we just stay the way we are now, we slowly die a spiritual death. It will be painful. So please consider your part in the year to come

Simple Tips to Avoid Getting Scammed

We are all targets and we are all vulnerable. Criminals everywhere are working around the clock to steal your money and your personal information. There's no guarantee you won't get taken, but there are many things you can do that can reduce the risk.



Be skeptical Question everything. Con artists know how to make their scams look and sound legitimate. Think it through and check it out before you respond in any way. You can check out companies and offers with the Better Business Bureau, Federal Trade Commission and National Fraud Information Center.

Guard your personal information Fraudsters use a variety of tricks to get you to divulge account numbers and passwords. They send bogus emails designed to look like it's from your bank and make calls pretending to be with your credit card company. A common ruse is for a phone bandit to ask for your account number and PIN to solve a computer problem or to stop fraudulent transactions spotted on your account. It doesn't matter what they say – hang up! When in doubt, contact the company in question by phone using a number you know to be legitimate – and ask what's up.

Your Social Security number is the key to your life. A thief can use it to steal your money and your identity. Social Security numbers are also used to access many financial and medical records. So only give it out when absolutely necessary to someone you know and trust.

Take your time Don't let anyone rush you into making a purchase. The buy-now-or-else approach is designed to keep you from comparison shopping. If the sales person tells you the price won't be good if you walk out the door – turn around and leave.

Get it in writing Verbal promises don't count. It doesn't matter what the salesperson tells you, the only thing that matters is what's written down. Most sales contracts specifically state that verbal promises are not binding. That's why you need to read, understand, and agree to the terms before you sign any contract.

Be wary of all links and attachments It's tempting to open an email attachment, especially when the message says it's a shipping invoice or some other document you'd want to see. Fraudsters count on your curiosity and that instant response to load malicious software onto your device. Unless it's something you're expecting and know for sure who it came from, don't open that attachment or click any links.

If you've really won a prize – it's free! Never pay to play a contest or to claim a prize. If the contest is legitimate, you're not required to buy anything or pay any money to get your prize – that's the law. You don't have to send in a processing fee, pay shipping or handling charges, or provide your credit card or bank account numbers for any reason. Remember: You can't win a contest you didn't enter.

Don't be fooled by free merchandise offers or money back guarantees Free is good, but be skeptical of ads that offer to send you a free sample. The initial product may be free, but they'll probably make you pay for shipping and handling. To cover that charge, you'll need to provide your credit or debit card number. Some dishonest companies then sign you up for additional monthly purchases which can be hard to stop.

Use a credit card for online and mail order purchases A credit card gives you better fraud protection than a debit card – credit cards are governed by different federal rules. With a credit card, you can dispute an unauthorized charge and the credit card company must take that charge off your bill while it investigates.
