Welcome, Summer! Enjoy your special day this month, dads. New in the church library this month:

Books

- 1. As I Crossed a Bridge of Dreams by an anonymous 11th Century C.E. Japanese Buddhist lady noble translated into English by Ivan Morris Part of the library's Japan Collection in honor of missionary and former Youth Director Matt Barany. A poetic journal for adult readers.
- 2. Harp of Burma by Michio Takeyama, translated from the Japanese into English by Howard Hibbett. A pacifist novel. Mainichi Prize winner. A UNESCO Collection of Contemporary Works translated book. Teen and adult readers. Part of the library's Japan Collection in honor of missionary and former Youth Director Matt Barany. Kon Ichikawa's live action film version is also available on dvd to borrow from the church library.
- 3. The Legend of the Poinsettia by Tomie dePaola. Illustrated by the author picture book back in the library for young readers!

DVDs

1. Hakuchi (The Idiot) Japan 1951 black-and-white 166 minutes subtitled live action feature drama adapted from the novel by Fyodor Dostoevsky Director: Akira Kurosawa with Toshiro Mifune, Setsuko Hara, Takashi Shimura, Masayuki Mori, and Yoshiko Kuga filmed in winter in Hokkaido A must-see classic for adult viewers. In your librarian's view, Kurosawa's greatest film.

- 2. Waga seishun ni kuinashi (No Regrets for Our Youth) Japan 1946 black-and-white 110 minutes subtitled live action feature pacifist drama Director: Akira Kurosawa starring Setsuko Hara in an amazing performance Suitable viewing for teens and adults.
- 3. Subarashiki nichiyobi (One Wonderful Sunday) Japan 1947 black-and-white 109 minutes subtitled live action feature musical romance Director: Akira Kurosawa Kurosawa's only excursion directly into either the musical or the romance genres. Certainly he's a fish out of water in both of them. Not recommended. Shades of Frank Capra films of the 1930s and 1920s silents by Frank Borzage. Extremely slow-paced.
- 4. Shubun (Scandal) Japan 1950 black-and-white 105 minutes subtitled live action feature social drama with famous Christmas scene Director: Akira Kurosawa starring Toshiro Mifune and Takashi Shimura The film immediately preceding Rashomon and arguably just as finely directed. Adult viewing. N.B.: Rashomon is also available on dvd to borrow from your church library.
- 5. Ikimono no kiroku (I Live in Fear a.k.a. Record of a Living Being) Japan 1955 black-and-white 103 minutes subtitled live action feature drama (that began as a satire) Director: Akira Kurosawa Co-starring Toshiro Mifune and Takashi Shimura. Famous scenes include the opening and closing. Arguably, Mifune's greatest acting performance, which is saying plenty. Features theremin music also. Adult viewing.
